



Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia, our Chancellor Alhaji Dr. Najib Hussaini Adamu and his entourage, our distinguished guests, our graduating students and Honorees to our 22nd to 24th Combined Convocation Ceremony.

This Convocation, to me is unique in many ways. Primarily, the Benue State University was established 32 years ago by a visionary Catholic Priest, Rev. Fr. Moses Orshio Adasu (late), to bring University education closer to the doorsteps of teeming Benue State indigenes, and other Nigerians. Since then, each Visitor attempted to bring their unique intervention to the greater growth of the University. For the purposes of history, it is important to avail ourselves with the efforts of the past Visitors.

His Excellency Senator George Akume now Secretary to the Government of the Federation, ensured that the College of Health Sciences was properly constructed, began construction of the Benue State University Teaching Hospital (BSUTH) in addition to regular subvention to the University. His Excellency, Senator Gabriel Suswam, PhD, constructed the Faculty of Law and the Suswam Female Hostel, completed construction of the BSUTH leading to eventual commissioning of the hospital in

2012, in addition to regular funding of the University.

His Excellency, Samuel Ioraenyi Ortom inherited a seven-monthold strike over Earned Academic Allowance/Earned Allowance (EAA/EA) and other sundry issues. He took a radical decision to implement the EAA/EA by integrating it into the monthly salaries of staff, a feat not even the Federal Government has achieved with Federal Universities. He cleared outstanding salaries and ensured that Benue State University was placed on first line charge; cleared the outstanding financial challenge that delayed the graduation and induction of the medical students of the College of Health Sciences for twelve vears.

Secondly, the present Visitor to the University by divine providence is also a Catholic Priest of 35 years, well known for his love for the masses and outright alignment of his policies to serve humanity. I am therefore, utterly convinced that the Benue State University, under his watch as the Visitor, will expand to its full potentials.

Your Excellency Sir, I am acutely aware of your blueprint as it concerns BSU. You desire that the University expands. That is why you encouraged us to visit Mbahar-Nanev in Adikpo for the possibility of moving the Faculty of Technology and Industrial Studies to Adikpo as part of

your expansion model. You also desire that you fund accreditation and most importantly research. You indeed desire that BSU answers its name as the 'University of First Choice.' Above all, you desire that staff show commitment, a sense of ownership and those called Professors truly qualify and profess the name.

Your Excellency Sir, before I proceed, let me inform this distinguished gathering what Benue State Government



Your Excellency, I must personally thank you. By this action, you and the Governing Council have empowered me to also make legitimate demands of commitment and productivity from our staff. But I also know that even today, you will not pass us by.

Thirdly, I am deeply elated to welcome Sir Paul Chukwuma, Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of the 7th Governing Council and

And fourthly, this it would appear, is the last Convocation of my tenure as the Vice-Chancellor of this great University. The last four years have been quite a journey. You will neither know nor understand nor appreciate the grace of God until you have found God. Your We have worked hard and pushed ourselves for this Convocation to be a success. A Convocation event provides us the opportunity not only to celebrate our achievements or graduate our students who have pushed themselves through tough learning conditions, but an opportunity to thank those who have supported and helped us as we grow as an institution.

Let me, therefore, use the moment to thank the Government of Benue State, led by Rev. Fr. Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia for helping to stabilize the University through regular and timely payment of salaries. The Government had established the University to provide higher education to the increasing population of Benue citizens and beyond. Thirty-two years after, the University has not just produced degree holders, but citizens with skills, acquired knowledge that are serving the society in different spheres of life. It was Abraham Lincoln who said, "The best way to predict your future is to create it." Rev. Fr. Moses Orshio Adasu, the Pioneer Visitor to BSU, recognized that Benue State had a future and so, created one by starting the first State-owned University in the Middlebelt and North of Nigeria. Adasu also fulfilled Zig Ziglar's statement that "You don't have to be great to start, but you have to start to be great." BSU is on the threshold of greatness.

The University has continued to receive tremendous support from diverse groups and individuals. The National Universities Commission (NUC) is a critical stakeholder. The Commission has not failed in its obligations to monitor and ensure quality, conduct necessary resource verification, accredit and approve programmes for the University. With the support of NUC, BSU has added new programmes and created four new faculties. The quality of direction and support BSU has enjoyed cannot be taken for granted.

The Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) is another major collaborator and stakeholder in the sustenance of higher education in Nigeria. It is an agency of the Federal Government. But most importantly, it is the product of the long struggles of the Academic Staff Union of Nigerian Universities (ASUU). More than half of the structures on our University are of TETFund. In the last eighteen months, TETFund has expended four billion, two hundred and forty million, two hundred and ninety-nine thousand, four hundred and twenty-seven N a i r a, t h i r t y K o b o (4,240,299,427.30) only on infrastructure, procurement and maintenance of existing TETFund facilities.

Meanwhile, three hundred and six million, two hundred and three thousand, three hundred and forty-nine Naira, fifteen Kobo (306, 203, 349.15) only was expended on staff training, conference attendance, funding of research and publications in the last eighteen months. We acknowledge and appreciate the contributions of TETFund over the years and particularly now, under the leadership of the Arc. Sonny Togo Echono, the Executive Secretary. In the last one year alone, over six projects of TETFund have been completed, some commissioned, some are ongoing.

We cannot forget the contributions of the secretariat of the Committee of Vice-Chancellors of the Nigerian Universities (CVCNU), Abuja. This body coordinates and facilitates knowledge upgrade, sharing and connecting with others and training. The immediate past Secretary General of CVCUN, Professor Yakubu Ochefu, a staff of BSU was an asset for BSU. BSU is again lucky to have Professor Andrew Haruna, a Pro-Chancellor and former Vice-Chancellor of Federal University Gasua, himself, a friend of the University. He is another great asset for BSU.

We must acknowledge the contributions of the Benue State Assembly led by His Excellency the Hon. Speaker, Rt. Hon. A on d on a D a j o h. The interventions to de-escalate union-based crises on campus in the last one year cannot go unnoticed.

There are numerous individuals

who have funded scholarships and donated books to our University. Some of these will be honoured at this Convocation. The University appreciates all these individuals within and in the diaspora, who have continued to encourage our students and the University with their support.

Today is another significant opportunity to present the accomplishments of the University to the world. You will recall that our last Convocation was tagged "BSU at 30: Boundless Years of Academic Growth," we had humbly clocked 30 years as a University. So, thirty years after, 'what next' is the fundamental question. With the humble beginning in 1992/93 academic session, and a population of 308 students and 149 academic staff, four faculties, we have grown into 14 faculties. At this Combined Convocation

event, the University will be conferring a total of 17,925 degrees and diplomas on graduands in the following categories:

- Bachelor's Degrees- 15,101
- Postgraduate Diplomas- 72
- Master's Degrees 2,196
- PhD Degrees 556

It is important to note that out of 15,101 graduands with Bachelors' degrees, 44 of them earned First Class. Prizes will be awarded to deserving students.

It is important I clarify quickly why we have these numbers as against the position of Association of Vice-Chancellors at what is popularly referred to as Sanger Mossiker in the Humanities at the University of Texas at Austin, USA. Professor Falola spoke about "**Power**, **Politics and Policies**."

Considering that I have commenced my last year as the Vice-Chancellor, it is a moment to critically look back and evaluate the academic and administrative experiences of this journey so far.

Academic Matters

One of my major achievements for BSU is the establishment of



"Keffi Declaration." Following the guidelines on the award of Honorary Degrees and Academic Tradition in Nigerian Universities, we are not unmindful that people would ask or raise issues with the number of awardees as against the guideline requirement that the number should not exceed three per convocation. For the purposes of clarity, this is a combined convocation. That is why we have a huge number of students graduating as stated above. This simple response should serve as additional clarification.

Yes, we witnessed the Convocation Lecture delivered by one of Nigeria's most prolific and finest scholars of history, Professor Toyin Falola. He is the Chair of Jacob and Frances

additional faculties. Since the last Convocation, I mentioned to us that NUC had scheduled resource verification for the Faculties of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Architecture and Communication and Media Studies. In addition, BSU applied to NUC for the splitting of the Faculty of Technology and Industrial Studies from the NUC Faculty of Education. favourably granted BSU the permission to establish these faculties after a successful exercise. So, we have four additional faculties to the existing ten. The additional faculties are: Pharmaceutical Sciences, Architecture, Technology and Industrial Studies, and Communication and Media Studies. I am also delighted to state that the first set

of students for Pharmaceutical Sciences have commenced the programme.

I am quite impressed with the quality and the outcome of accreditation since my appointment as the Vice-Chancellor. BSU had accreditation for 30 programmes since the last Convocation. The outcome is 99.9% success. 29 programmes got full accreditation, and one programme got interim.

Our staff have continued to improve in research and innovation. At the Faculty of Technology and Industrial Studies, staff have constructed hybrid maize thresher, motorized and manually operated groundnut sheller, and a Bambara nut sheller. Through TETFund, many teaching staff competed for the National Research Fund (NRF) and the Management is hopeful of a greater number of beneficiaries better the previous year. Meanwhile, over twenty teaching staff competed and got funding through TETFund for the Institutional Based Research (IBR) grant. We must admit that TETFund has remained the major source of funding for research and development in the University.

Other sources of research include the World Bank through the Center for Food Technology and Research (CEFTER), Greenwich University in the United Kingdom and DAAD-Germany (Academic Exchange), and international agencies like UNDP. In addition to issues of post-harvest losses, there is ongoing TETFund research on "the entomological assessment and impact of the termite infestation on schools, residential buildings, on economic trees," and "Preservation of Colonial Buildings and Layouts in Digital Form as Instructional Materials." Other ongoing research are in the areas of entrepreneurship and innovation

in the food industry.

The Centre for Food Technology and Research (CEFTER) remains one of the most active arms of the University in terms of research and collaboration. Through CEFTER the visibility of the University has increased in terms of collaboration with local and international communities. At the local level, CEFTER has contacts and community-based groups with farmers in the 23 Local Government Areas. CEFTER has facilitated over 10 startup businesses in partnership with UNDP. Through CEFTER, BSU has established a strong relationship with many Universities in Zagreb (Croatia), the United Kingdom, United States, Germany, the Netherlands and India.

Even more important for our guests, the citizens of Benue State and Nigerians at large, what to know is that, at CEFTER-BSU over 100 postgraduate students from the Central and West African Regions are being trained. The benefiting countries so far are Nigeria, Cameroon, Niger, the Sudan, South Sudan, Ghana, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, the Gambia and Liberia, in the areas of food chemistry. This is a grant BSU was selected among 7 institutions out of 74 applicants.

The most significant highlight for BSU is the Centre for Food Technology and Innovation Complex (CEFTIC). This complex is among the many outputs from the World Bank Ace-Impact project. It is a place with the permission of His Excellency, I would encourage everyone to visit and appreciate the contributions of the World Bank to BSU and the State.

There is also the Food Technology Laboratory, second to none in the Northern part of Nigeria. Colleagues who have visited the laboratory for accreditation have openly commended it and the quality of equipment installed therein. CEFTER-BSU is also competed for the Seedings Lab grant and won and have received a variety of equipment worth five hundred million (N500,000,000.00) Naira only. The equipment collection is for advanced scientific research for both PhD and Postdoctoral studies. Among these is the Leica M844F40 surgical microscope w or th seventy million (N70,000,000.00) Naira only to be donated to the Benue State University Teaching Hospital (BSUTH).

Examination Results

BSU has over the years had issues of delayed students results, no availability or long processes of issuance of transcripts. On behalf of the Senate and Management of the University, I am glad to state that this embarrassment has been minimized substantially. We have not met our goal yet, but we will surely get there in no distant time at all. Management is putting in place strategies to eliminate perceived obstacles that cause any form of delays. Our undergraduate students see their results now and postgraduate students are graduating timely. This action has caused huge increase in the number of students seeking to make BSU a University of first choice. It may interest the public to know that BSU has received over 24, 000 applications from JAMB of potential students who have made BSU a University of first choice.

Our students

I am very proud of our students. I personally appreciate their resilience, perseverance, quality and ability to embrace change as they pursue their passions and purpose as a community. The Management of the University appreciates them greatly because, the students recognize that the changes we make in terms of restructuring of the academic calendar is always in their own interest.

Our students have continued to excel at national competitions. Let me on behalf of the Council, Management and Senate of the University, acknowledge these students that have brought additional recognition and honour to the University through their competitive activities. These are

- 1). Mkorna Paul Ahon, and Ameh Innocent Saint of the Faculty of Law recently emerged as winner and runner up in the Eyitayo Dada National Lawson Essay Competition.
- 2) Miss Musa Ene Augusta, a student of the Department of Accounting emerged as the winner of the Chief Medical Director's Undergraduate Essay Competition, organized by the CMD of the Benue State University Teaching Hospital.
- 3) Aondoakaa Ngutor Joseph and Edu Isaac of 400 level Faculty of Law emerged as second runner up at the Leadership Development Programme Debate Competition.
- 4) Agbo Joy Enuwa, another 400-level student of Law emerged the second runner up at the National Arbitration Debate Competition.
- 5) Gabriel Shima Aondofa, 400 level emerged the National President, Law Students Association of Nigeria.
- 6) Michael Obekpa, 400 level student of the Department of History, emerged Deputy Senate President of the National Association of University Students (NAUS).

Management is very particular about our students. In addition to learning, their participation in the governance of the University is very key. Management has consciously ensured that our students are involved and engaged in all major events at the University including the ongoing Convocation exercise.

2023/2024 Student Union Elections

When this Management introduced the electronic voting system during the Student Union Elections in 2021, little did we know that the approach will provide such opportunities for greater justice to prevail and students from minority groups to benefit. Through this process the:

I. Miss Agatha Soohemba Aker, a graduate from the Faculty of Law emerged as the first female student to ever emerge as Student Union President in BSU.

The last Student Union elections produced for the first time an Idoma student, Oyi Samuel Alechenu from the Faculty of Law as the President. As a result of this approach, we have eliminated violence- induced elections to the barest minimum.

We will continue to pursue this approach, encourage as well as create more democratic spaces for our students to express themselves with every sense of civic responsibility, participation, and due process.

ii. At the last Convocation I made a categorical state that "we are working very hard to review some important policies relating to students Examination Misconduct in particular." Management and Senate have taken a very bold decision that students who are apprehended for examination misconduct, will serve stipulated punishment on campus while still attending lectures. Let me be clear about this. There are certain offences that would earn the student suspension or expulsion if found guilty. To this end, Senate of the University took a brave step and granted amnesty to 103 students who were found guilty of the University Examination regulations and were to be suspended or expelled accordingly. Massive awareness is being created to ensure that students are duly informed of this development.

Graduation of Medical Students

Since the last Convocation, barely 17months after, the University inducted two sets of Medical Doctors totaling 99. On 18^{th} September 2023, the 9^{th} induction of 41 students took place. Another set of 58 was inducted on 16th July 2024. It is important to add the good news relating to the admission quota for MBBS in BSU. Before last year's convocation in February, it was 75. The Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCN), after successful accreditation increased the admission quota by 75 raising the total number to 150. Similarly, the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Nigeria has increased the admission quota of the Nursing programme from 50 to 100, after successful professional accreditation.

Policy on Quality Assurance and Instruments

For any University to produce graduates who can compete favourably in a market-driven and skilled economy, the processes leading to their production (input-process-out) must be quality assured. The Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standard (CCMAS) is being fully implemented in our University.

Administrative Developments:

1. Appointment of new Chancellor of Benue State University

His Excellency, the Executive Governor of Benue State and Visitor to Benue State and Visitor to Benue State University, Rev. Fr. Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia, in exercise of the power vested on him by Section 9(1) of the Benue State University Law 2020, has appointed a new Chancellor, His Royal Highness, Alhaji, Dr. Najib Hussaini Adamu, CON, the 10th Emir of Kazaure, Kazaure Emirate to replace King (Barr) Disrael Gbobo Bob-Manuel II, Owukori IX, Amanyanabo of Abonnema. The appointment is for a single tenure of five (5) years. We wish to use this medium to also congratulate His Royal Highness on this appointment.

2. Constitution of the 7th Governing Council

You will recall that the Visitor to Benue State University, the Executive Governor of Benue State University, His Excellency, Rev. Fr. Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia, on 17th July, 2023, dissolved the 6th Governing Council of the University. The Visitor on 19th July 2024 appointed the 7th Governing Council Chaired by Sir Paul Chukwuma.

3. Appointment of the Registrar A new Registrar has been

appointed for the University. He is Barnabas Terfa Hemba. Until his appointment, he was the Deputy Registrar, Senior Staff Establishment at Benue State University.

4. Management of Industrial Relations

Gradually, we are recognizing that we can flourish better as a community and the sense of belonging grows and deepens. At the same time, we are upgrading our operational strategies in managing organisations. By this we mean growing above the purpose of self but for the purpose of the University. Asking ourselves critical questions, whether we are leading or lagging in our University? Do we have a clearly defined ambition and what does success look like for our University? To this end, Management has continued to encourage teamwork, create a continuous employee listening system, engage with Unions on Campus to brief them on progress and

challenges of the University. But with the zeal and measures already taken by the Council of the University, we are hopeful that industrial disharmony on campus will be history.

- ii. Completion of the Centre for Food Technology and Innovation Complex (CEFTIC), awaiting commissioning

We must acknowledge the contributions of the Benue State Assembly led by His Excellency the Hon. Speaker, Rt. Hon. Aondona Dajoh. The interventions to de-escalate union-based crises on campus in the last one year cannot go unnoticed.

There are numerous individuals that have funded scholarships and donated books to our university. Some of these will be honored at this convocation. The University appreciates all these

accomplishments of the university to the world. It is important to mention that this maybe the last Pre-Convocation Press briefing that I will be having with you as the 6th Vice-Chancellor of the Benue State University.

You will recall that I took over from my predecessor, Professor Moses Msugh Kembe on 3rd November 2020. I have commenced my last year in office, and I am glad that the grace God Almighty has brought me thus far. Now, you understand why this convocation is strategic and important to me. Therefore, my briefing will focus

mainly on the activities of the

22nd, 23rd, and 24th Combined Convocation. However, I will use this moment to equally speak about our achievements in BSU. You will recall that our last Convocation was tagged "BSU at 30: Boundless Years of Academic Growth," we had humbly clocked 30years as a university. So, thirty years after, 'what next' is the fundamental question. With the humble beginning in 1992/93 academic session, and a population of 308 students and 149 academic staff, four faculties, we have grown into 14 faculties.

It is important I clarify quickly why we have these numbers as against the position of Association of Vice Chancellors at what is popularly referred to as "Keffi Declaration." Following the guidelines on the award of Honorary Degrees and Academic Tradition in Nigerian Universities, we are not

Honorary Doctorate Degrees of the University will be conferred on the following distinguished Nigerians, two of whom are postunmindful that people would ask or raise issues with the number of awardees as against the guideline requirement that the number should not exceed three per convocation. For the purposes of clarity, this is a combined convocation. That is why we have a huge number of students graduating as stated above. This simple response should serve as additional clarification.

Technically, the activities of the combined convocation have commenced. The students flagged off their departmental football competition today amongst other sports. Short Media briefings on radio have been going on. The university will continue with the Vice Chancellor's Free Health Care for all staff and community members. However, the Press briefing on Thursday 5th December, will officially announce the full commencement of the Convocation programmes.

The two most significant moments for us, are the Commissioning of the Food Lab and the Centre for Food Technology and Innovation Centre (CEFTIC) at 11: 00 am, before the Convocation Lecture at Friday 6th December 2024, at 2:00 PM. The Convocation Lecture is to be delivered by one of Nigeria's most prolific and finest scholars of history, Professor Toyin Falola. He is the Chair of Jacob and Frances Sanger Mossiker in the Humanities, at the University of Texas at Austin, USA. Professor Falola has proposed to speak about "Power, Politics and Policies."

At the last convocation, the Management of the University considered and approved the recognition of pioneer staff and students that have distinguished themselves at the Convocation Lecture. This approach will be sustained even at this year's Convocation Lecture. The Convocation, which is the main event, will follow the next day Saturday 7th December 2024 at 10:00 am at the BSU

Convocation Square.

Considering that I have commenced my last year as the Vice Chancellor, it is a moment to critically look back and evaluate the academic and administrative experiences of this journey so far.

ACADEMIC MATTERS

One of my major achievements for BSU is the establishment of additional faculties. Since the last convocation. I mentioned to us that NUC had scheduled resource verification for the Faculties of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Architecture and Media and Communication Studies. In addition, BSU applied to NUC for the splitting of the Faculty of Technology and Industrial Studies from the Faculty of Education. NUC favorably granted the BSU the permission to establish these faculties after a successful exercise. So, we have four additional faculties to the existing ten. The additional faculties are: Pharmaceutical Sciences, Architecture, Technology and Industrial Studies, and Communication and Media studies. I am also delighted to state that the first set of students for Pharmaceutical Sciences have commenced the programme.

I am quite impressed with the quality and the outcome of accreditation since my appointment as the Vice Chancellor. BSU had accreditation for 30 programmes since the last convocation. The outcome is 99.9% success. 29 programmes got full accreditation, and one programme got interim. Within the same period also, some realignment of departments took place. For instance, in the department of Political Science, Senate reconsidered and approved the movement of the Public Administration to Faculty

of Management Science in line with NUC stipulations.

To stabilize our academic calendar, the Senate of the University approved the merging of two academic sessions, 2021/2022 and 2022/2023. Unfortunately, this attempt is already affected due the strike action of staff during the year. But because the Management of the university is poised to be effective, we continually adapt new priorities and practices to stay ahead of new realities. So, the Management is determined to ensure that the academic calendar is restored in 2025.

the Institutional Based Research (IBR) grant. We must admit that TETFund has remained the major source of funding for research and development in the University.

Other sources of research include the World Bank through the Center for Food Technology and Research (CEFTER), Greenwich University in the United Kingdom and DAAD-Germany (Academic Exchange), and international agencies like UNDP. In addition to issues of post-harvest losses, there is ongoing TETFund research on the entomological assessment



Our staff have continued to improve in research and innovation. At the Faculty of Technology and Industrial Studies, staff have constructed hybrid maize thresher, motorized and manually operated groundnut sheller, and a Bambara nut sheller. Through TETFund, many Teaching staff competed for the National Research Fund (NRF) and the Management is hopeful of a greater number of beneficiaries better the previous year. Meanwhile, over twenty Teaching staff competed and got funding through TETFund for and impact of the termite infestation on schools, residential buildings, on economic trees etc. Other ongoing research are in the areas of entrepreneurship and innovation in the food industry. Dr. Raymond Tyohemba is responsible for the DAAD-Germany Academic Exchange. So, the Centre for Food Technology and Research (CEFTER) remains one of the most active arms of the university in terms of research and collaboration. Through CEFTER the visibility of the University has increased in terms

of collaboration with local and international community. At the local level, CEFTER has contacts and community-based groups with farmers in 23 local government areas. Through CEFTER, BSU has established a strong relationship with many Universities in Zagreb (Croatia), the United Kingdom, United States, Germany, the Netherlands, and India.

Even more important for the Press, the Citizens of Benue State and Nigerians at large to know is that, at CEFTER-BSU over 100 postgraduate students from the Central and West African Region are being trained . The benefiting countries so far are Nigeria, Cameroon, Niger, Sudan, South Sudan, Ghana, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, the Gambia

and Liberia, in the areas of food chemistry. This is a grant BSU was selected among 7 institutions out of 74 applicants.

T h e m o s t s i g n i f i c a n t highlight for BSU is the Centre for Food Technology and Innovation C o m p l e x (CEFTIC). This complex is among the many outputs from the World Bank Ace-Impact

project. It is a place the Press would like to visit and appreciate the contributions of the World Bank to BSU and the State.

There is also the Food Technology Laboratory, second to none in the Northern part of Nigeria. Colleagues that have visited the Lab for accreditation have openly commended it and the quality of equipment installed in the Lab. Perhaps a few of you would visit to physically appraise for yourselves how BSU has grown.

CEFTER-BSU is also competed for the Seedings Lab grant and won and have received variety equipment worth Five hundred million (#500,000,000.00) naira only. The equipment are for advanced scientific research for both PhD and Postdoctoral studies. Among these is the Leica M844F40 surgical microscope worth Seventy Million (#70,000,000.00) naira only to be donated to the Benue State University Teaching Hospital (BSUTH). This equipment is a high-end device for ophthalmic eye procedures, either for anterior or posterior segment of the eve.

Examination Results

Journalist have confronted me many times on the issue of

delayed students results, no availability or long processes of issuance of transcripts. It is true that "some of you" (the professionals), have taken to the social media to scandalize the University about these matters. Of course, when I took over, there were series of petitions, complaints over delayed results of undergraduates and what others described as the unending postgraduate programmes. To this end, students' population in all programmes was beginning to diminish. On behalf of the Senate and Management of the University, I am glad to state that this embarrassment has been minimized substantially. We have not met our goal, but we will surely get there in no distant time at all. Management is putting place strategies to eliminate per*ceived obstacles that cause any form of delays. For instance, by introducing CBT GST and EPS examinations, no lecturer will use GST or EPS as a reason to delay the timely submission of results. Our undergraduate students can see their results now and postgraduate students are graduating timely. This action has caused huge increase in the number of students seeking to make BSU a university of first

choice. It may interest the Press and the public to know that BSU has received over 2 4, 000 applications from J A M B o f potential students that have made BSU a university of first choice.

Our Students I am very proud of our students. I p e r s o n a l l y appreciate their r e s i l i e n c e, perseverance.

quality and ability to embrace change as they pursue their passions and purpose as a community. The Management of the University appreciates them greatly because, the students recognize that the changes we make both in terms of restructuring of the academic calendar is always in their own interests.

Our students have continued to excel at national competitions. Let me on behalf of the Council, Management and Senate of the University, I would like to acknowledge these students that have brought additional recognition to the University through their competitive activities. These are

3) Aondoakaa Ngutor Joseph and Edu Isaac of 400 level Faculty of Law, emerged second runner up at the Leap Africa Youth Leadership Development P r o g r a m m e D e b a t e Competition.

4) Agbo Joy Enuwa, another 400level student of Law, emerged second runner up at the National Arbitration Debate

Competition.

5) Gabriel Shima Aondofa, 400level emerged the National President Law Students Association of Nigeria.

6) Michael Obekpa 400- level student of the Department of History, emerged Deputy Senate President of the National Association of University Students (NAUS).

Management is very particular about our students. In addition to learning, their participation in the governance of the university is very key. Management has consciously ensured that our students are involved and engaged in all major events at the University including the ongoing convocation exercise.

2023/2024 Student Union Elections

When this Management

introduced the electronic voting system during the Students Union Elections in 2021, little did we know that the approach will provide such opportunities for justice to prevail and students from minority groups to benefit. This process has provided opportunities for the first female student to ever emerge as SU President in BSU.

Miss Agatha Soohemba Aker a graduate from the Faculty of Law. The last SU Elections produced for the first time an Idoma Student, Oyi Samuel Alechenu from the Faculty of Law as the President. As a result of this approach, we have eliminated violence induced elections to the barest minimum.

We will continue to pursue this approach, encourage as well as create more democratic spaces for our students to express themselves with every sense of civic responsibility, participation, and due process.

At the last convocation press briefing, some of you will recall I made a categorical state that "we are working very hard to review some important policies relating to students Examination Misconduct in particular." Management and Senate have taken a very bold decision that students who are apprehended for examination misconduct, will serve stipulated punishment on campus while still attending lectures. Let me be clear about this. There are certain offences that would earn the student suspension or expulsion if found guilty. To this end, Senate of the University took a bold step and granted amnesty to 103 students that were found guilty of the University Examination regulations and were to be suspended or expelled accordingly. Massive awareness is being created to ensure that students are duly informed of this development.

Since the last convocation, barely 17months after, the University inducted two sets of Medical Doctors totaling 99. On 18th September 2023, the 9th induction of 41 students took place. Another set of 58 was inducted on 16th July 2024. It is important to add that the good news relating to the admission quota for MBBS in BSU. Before last year's convocation in February, it was 75. The Nigerian Medical and Dental Council (NMDC), after successful accreditation increased the admission quota by 75 raising the total number to 150. Similarly, the Nursing Council of Nigeria has increased the admission quota of the Nursing Department from 50 to 100, after successful professional accreditation.

The appointment is for a single tenure of five (5) years. We wish to use this medium to also congratulate His Royal Highness on this appointment.

- 3. Appointment of the Registrar A new Registrar has been appointed for the University. He is Barnabas Terfa Hemba. Until his appointment, he was the Deputy Registrar, Senior Staff Establishment at Benue State University.
- 3. Management of Industrial Relations

Gradually, we are recognizing that we can flourish better as a community and the sense of belonging grows and deepens. At the same time, we are upgrading our operational strategies in managing organizations. By this we mean growing above the purpose of self but for the purpose of the university. Asking ourselves critical questions, whether we are leading or lagging in our university? Do we have a clearly defined ambition and what does success look like for our university? To this end, Management has continued to encourage teamwork, create a continuous employee listening system, engage with Unions on Campus to brief them on progress and challenges of the University. These measures are aimed at forestalling industrial disharmony on campus.



Governor Alia Authorizes Management to Relocate Faculty of Technology to Mbahar

n a significant development for Benue State University (BSU), the Executive Governor of Benue State, His Excellency, Revd Fr. Dr. Hyacinth Iormem Alia in his capacity as the Visitor to the university, has directed the Management of the University to relocate the Faculty of the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Tor Joe Iorapuu, and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Simon Terver Ubwa, following their inspection of the abandoned facilities at the former site of the proposed Federal Polytechnic, Adikpo. The Vice-Chancellor and his team were warmly received



Technology and Industrial Studies to Mbahar in Kwande Local Government Area. The directive comes on the heels of a report submitted by during their visit by the Ter Kwande, traditional rulers and community opinion leaders.

The relocation, expected to significantly enhance the

university's growth, marks an expansion of BSU's academic and infrastructural footprint. The site, which spans 190 hectares, has been well-preserved by the local community, earning the V i c e - C h a n c e I l o r ' s commendation for their vigilance in protecting the facilities from vandalism over the years.

Speaking on the development with journalists, the Vice-Chancellor highlighted the institution's readiness to comply with the Governor's directive, stating that the Senate and Council would convene shortly to initiate the necessary processes. He emphasized the importance of this expansion for fostering academic excellence and advancing BSU's mission of delivering impactful education to Benue State and beyond.

Professor Tarhule Advocates Enhanced Funding for Non-Custodial Laws in Nigeria

The Dean of the Postgraduate School at the Benue State University (BSU), Professor Vearumun Vitalis Tarhule, has urged the Nigerian government to allocate adequate funding to the judiciary to facilitate the full must be allowed to fulfil its responsibility to appropriate enough funds for it," he stated. The Dean of Postgradaute School explored various challenges surrounding the newly introduced non-custodial sanctions in Nigeria. He identified statutory deficiencies in the enactment of laws, external factors such as underfunding, a lack of sentencing guidelines and the non-implementation of sentencing hearings as key issues contributing to the inadequate enforcement of non-custodial



implementation of non-custodial laws in the country. He made this r e c o m m e n d a t i o n w h i l e delivering the 16th Inaugural lecture on the theme, "The Dilemma of Implementing Non-Custodial Sanctions in Nigeria," which coincided with his 60th birthday celebration.

Professor Tarhule emphasized that insufficient funding remains a significant barrier to effective implementation of non-custodial laws, affecting traditional services including the police and judiciary. "The National Assembly that passed the law laws. He highlighted a troubling scenario where individuals who should not be incarcerated often find themselves in custody, illustrating the complexities surrounding these laws.

The professor pointed out that the judiciary's reluctance to adopt sentencing hearings further complicates the situation. He argued that this reluctance prevents the effective administration of non-custodial laws, which could otherwise assist judges in their decisionmaking processes. Moreover, he critiqued the inconsistent application of sentencing guidelines, lamenting that although some states have adopted them, judges frequently fail to implement them.

To address these issues, Professor Tarhule proposed that the Supreme Court of Nigeria should amend its provisions to clearly define various sentencing options, including suspended and custodial sentences. He drew comparisons with the UK system, noting that while the UK's Criminal Justice Act dedicates 23 sections to suspended sentences, Nigeria currently has only one section, which inadequately covers the subject.

"The suspended sentence must be tied to specific conditions similar to those in the United Kingdom," he stressed, advocating for the establishment of essential organisations to eliminate obstacles hindering the implementation of non-custodial laws.

Professor Tarhule highlighted the importance of harmonising the objectives of non-custodial services with the Nigerian Correctional Service, suggesting that the lack of properly constituted bodies significantly undermines the effectiveness of non-custodial measures. He pointed out contradictions between the Supreme Court's provisions and the Correctional Service Act, particularly concerning the appointment and promotion of probation officers, which further complicates enforcement.

To enhance clarity and functionality within the system, he recommended that all contradictions between the Supreme Court and the Correctional Service Act be resolved through legislative amendments. He called for explicit terms regarding parole, particularly for life sentences, to provide transparency in the legal framework.


"The Nigerian correctional institutions, including the police

and correctional services, must be adequately funded and equipped to fulfil their responsibilities in criminal administration," he asserted. He also urged the judiciary to adopt and implement sentencing hearings for all convicted defendants, as this would aid judges in making informed decisions.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor of BSU, Professor Tor Joe Iorapuu, encouraged Nigerians to read the constitution to better understand their rights. He also recommended that the public access Professor Tarhule's book on his inaugural lecture, noting its potential to impact communities, particular. lecture.

Professor Agba Illuminates Medical Advancements in 17th Inaugural Lecture at BSU: "Biophysics and Medical Physics-Extending the Frontiers of Medicine"

In a thought-provoking and engaging inaugural lecture, Professor Emmanuel Hemen Agba from the Department of Physics, Benue State University captivated an audience of students, faculty and esteemed guests with his address titled "Biophysics and Medical Physics: Extending the Frontiers of Medicine." This marked the 17th inaugural lecture in the university's history, further



Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic) Professor Simon Terver Ubwa highlighted the importance of inaugural lectures in educating the university community about research outputs, community engagement and mentorship. He praised Professor Tarhule for his significant contributions, describing him as a unifier and mobiliser within his community.

The event featured a cake-cutting for Professor Tarhule's 60th birthday, alongside the presentation of a plaque of honour by the Vice-Chancellor in recognition of his successful delivery of the 16th inaugural underscoring the institution's commitment to advancing scientific knowledge and innovation.

The event commenced with a warm welcome from the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Tor Joe Iorapuu, who lauded Professor Agba's extensive contributions to the fields of biophysics and medical physics. "Professor Agba has not only demonstrated exceptional academic prowess but has also shown a remarkable dedication to fostering research that has the potential to impact the health sector significantly," he remarked.

Professor Agba began his lecture

by outlining the critical roles that biophysics and medical physics play in modern medicine. He emphasised the importance of understanding the physical principles underlying biological processes, stating, "Biophysics serves as a bridge between biology and physics, allowing us to explore complex biological systems through the lens of physical science." His insights highlighted how this interdisciplinary approach is crucial for developing innovative medical technologies and therapeutic techniques.

One of the key themes of the lecture was the application of physics principles to medical imaging technologies, such as MRI and CT scans. Professor Agba illustrated how advancements in these technologies have revolutionised diagnostics, enabling healthcare professionals to detect diseases with greater accuracy and efficiency. "Medical physics is at the forefront of enhancing patient care," he noted, "by ensuring that diagnostic tools are both effective and safe for patients.'

The lecture also touched on emerging trends in biophysics research, including the use of nanotechnology in drug delivery systems and the potential of biosensors in disease detection. Professor Agba passionately conveyed his belief that continued research and collaboration in these areas could lead to breakthroughs that significantly improve health outcomes.

Professor Eriba Believes Persuasive Communication to Boost Science Enrolment

Benue State University, hosted its 18th Inaugural Lecture, delivered by Professor Joel Eriba, an esteemed Professor of Chemistry Education, who addressed the long-standing issue of declining enrolment in science courses across Nigeria's higher education institutions. Known for his engaging and insightful approach, Professor Eriba presented a wealth of research findings, historical data and examples that highlighted the persistent gap in science enrolment, particularly since the introduction of the national policy advocating a 60:40 enrolment ratio in favour of science disciplines.

Citing data from the university's early years, Professor Eriba noted that at its inception in 1992, Benue State University had zero enrolment in the sciences, while the arts and social sciences recorded a substantial intake of 380 students. He attributed the ongoing downward trend in science enrolment to students' negative attitudes towards the subject, emphasizing that a student's internal rejection of science often manifests in disengagement.

In proposing a solution, Professor Eriba recommended the Persuasive Communication Model (PCM) as an effective tool to positively shift students' attitudes towards science. He explained that the model, widely used by other researchers, has science enrolments. His findings were supported by empirical research conducted with 1,840 junior secondary school students across 44 schools in Benue State, showing that PCM interventions significantly improved students' attitudes towards science.

Professor Eriba advised science teachers to exhibit positive attitudes towards both the subject and their students, fostering a more welcoming environment that could inspire students to consider science as a viable academic and career path. His lucid and anecdotal delivery, drawn from over four decades of teaching experience, brought science to life in a manner that made complex ideas accessible and relevant to a wide audience.

Opening his lecture with reflections on his challenging journey into education, Professor Eriba shared personal stories of resilience, recounting how he began primary school at the age of 10 due to financial hardships. He expressed profound gratitude to God and paid tribute to family members, mentors, teachers and other supporters who helped him



demonstrated substantial success in transforming negative perceptions. He further underscored that understanding an individual's belief system is crucial in predicting attitudes and guiding actions, asserting that the PCM could play a pivotal role in reversing the trend of declining overcome these early obstacles.

In his remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Tor Joe Iorapuu, initially represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Simon Ubwa, praised Professor Eriba's choice of topic, noting its

significance for future science enrolments and the impact of attitude on life choices. He affirmed the potential of the Persuasive Communication Model in addressing enrolment challenges in higher education. Professor Iorapuu, who later joined the event alongside the Vice-Chancellor and Principal of Ernest Bai Koroma University of Science and Technology (EBKUST) in Sierra Leone, Revd. Professor Edwin Julius Jeblar Momoh, encouraged other professors to follow suit by delivering their inaugural lectures, underscoring its importance for the university's global standing.

The event culminated in the joint p r e s e n t a t i o n o f a commemorative plaque to Professor Eriba by Professors Iorapuu and Momoh. The ceremony featured a procession of university Senate members, led by the Registrar, and concluded with a recess led by the Vice-Chancellor, following academic tradition.

Guests enjoyed a cultural presentation by the University's Cultural Troupe, and a reception hosted by Professor Eriba's family. The Provost's wife, Mrs. Christy Eriba, added a personal touch with a song of thanksgiving, celebrating the lecturer's accomplishments and the family's gratitude to God. The gathering included family, friends, former students, and representatives from the Federal College of Education, Odugbo, where Professor Eriba currently serves as Provost. The lecture marked a memorable milestone, resonating with attendees and enriching Benue State University's tradition of academic excellence.

Professor Ekoja Advocates Archival Documentation in Organizations

Professor of Library and Information Science and the University Librarian, Benue State University, Professor Innocent Isa Ekoja has advocated the need for proper record keeping in organizations to enhance effective administration. "It is only when records are properly kept in Public and private sectors, that they can be easily retrieved when the need arises".

According to him, records are organic documents used for current transactions in organizations and are pre-archival collections, therefore, all records are potential archival materials. Though in reality, not all of them make it to the archives, except those of enduring value.

Professor Ekoja disclosed this at Window on America, Main Library, while delivering the 6th Library Seminar Series with the theme: "Records and Archives Management in Organizations" on 17th September, 2024.

He emphasized that, archiving is very important in organizations because their transactions involve the generation of information materials, some of which have enduring value and so must be archived for future consultation. He added that, records management is very important in organizations because by the nature of their transactions, they create, maintain and use records (pre-archival collections), and when these records are no longer useful, they are disposed of. Stressing that, records and archival management are important in organizations because they are geared towards the provision of access to the information contained in the contents of the items they keep.

Benefits of archival documentation include: indispensable working tools for government officials, invaluable tools for development in the private sectors for their business transactions, settlement of disputes, scholarly study and consciousness and identity, effective Public Administration and enhanced demographic data.

He concluded that, archives are invaluable in several ways which can lead to decision making as well as day-to-day administration of organizations. Therefore, archives are vehicles of evidence for past achievements for which present and future efforts seek improvements.

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration) Professor Mike Odugbo Odey, Chairman of the session commended the University Librarian for resuscitating the Library Seminar Series and called on other Departments and Faculties to emulate.

He described the topic as apt and timely with a promise that Management would explore the likelihood of extending it to the entire University.

Former Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic) Professor Edward Agbo Omudu commended the library for organizing the Seminar on Records keeping and expressed optimism that it would be extended to the entire University.

driving academic growth and aligning BSU with global innovation trends. He expressed gratitude for the collaboration with UNDP, stating that the Unipod Hub will serve as a "beacon of learning and experimentation, preparing students and staff to solve realworld challenges." He added that BSU is committed to integrating the hub's facilities into the university's curriculum to foster hands-on learning and practical application.

The UNDP team praised the University's commitment to the project, noting that the Unipod Hub at BSU has the potential to become a central point for collaborative



lab for agricultural innovation. Additionally, the facility would house a Creative lab to inspire artistic exploration, a **Textiles lab** supporting studies in material science and fashion and an IT and Prototype lab focused on software development and model testing.

Speaking at the event, Professor Iorapuu emphasized the importance of such facilities in

research, entrepreneurship and technological development in the region.

The inspection concluded with a guided tour of sections of the Hub, where on-going work and future plans for the facility were reviewed in detail. The visit marked a key milestone in the project, which aims to be a model for innovation in Nigerian universities and beyond.

BSU Signs MoU with Africa Plus Partners for New 1600-Bed Space Student Hostel

he Vice-Chancellor, Benue State University, Professor Tor Joe Iorapuu has commended Tertiary Education Trust Fund (Tetfund) for taking a significant step towards addressing student accommodation challenges in the University. He applauded

He disclosed the project would be funded by Tertiary Education Trust fund (Tetfund) based on Public Private Partnership, stating that as a pilot scheme, the project had been awarded to twelve tertiary institutions across the six geopolitical zones. These include: six (6) Universities, three (3) Polytechnics and three (3) Colleges of Education. He informed, work had since commenced in three tertiary institutions: Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria; Akwa-Ibom College of Education, Warri and Federal College of Education, Zuba.

The MoU was necessitated to pave way for immediate planning and implementation, with project timelines and milestones to be set

Tetfund for providing One Billion Naira for execution of the project. Professor Iorapuu on Wednesday,

30th October, 2024 while signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Africa Plus Partners an Abuja-based firm, disclosed the agreement which focuses on the construction of a 1600-bed space hostel is aimed towards enhancing quality of life for students on campus and is expected to create a conducive learning environment.

The signing ceremony was held at the Vice-Chancellor's Conference Room with Africa Plus Partners represented by its Director, Dipo Lawore and the Project Manager, Toluwanimi Omolayo.

Professor Iorapuu highlighted the importance of the project, noting that increasing accommodation capacity aligns with the institution's commitment to student welfare and academic excellence. "This collaboration marks a new chapter for our university as we strive to create an environment conducive enough to accommodate



student population. By alleviating the existing accommodation shortage, the project also seeks to reduce off-campus commuting, thereby ensuring that more students can reside on campus and fully engage in university life.






